
RIOJA ESSENTIALS

1. Unique first-class wineries

n Rioja, more than 200 wineries open their doors to the public to share the feeling of pride in a wine culture that unites the entire region.

Contemporary architecture, centuries-old family wineries surrounded by vineyards or mountains, flanked by a river, historical cellars with unique attractions (on the Camino de Santiago, with hermitages, with works of art...) and much much more, the authentic cathedrals of wine full of surprises to visitors in Rioja offering **unique wine tourism experiences**, combining wine, gastronomy, art, culture, learning, and fun.

If you want to experience Rioja in an authentic way and discover its contrasts, we recommend **visiting at least 3 wineries** of different types during your trip. Use our **Winery Finder** to plan your next adventure.



2. Charming wine-producing villages

Laguardia, Haro, Briones, Briñas, Sajazarra, Cuzcurrita, San Vicente de la Sonsierra, Santo Domingo de la Calzada, Alfaro, Arnedo, Calahorra, Quel, Elciego, Labastida, Nájera, Viana, Mendavia... In Rioja, you will find picturesque wine-producing villages with a unique charm and history. Some of these rank among the Most Beautiful Villages of Spain (such as Briones, Sajazarra or Laguardia), or the Magic Villages of Spain (such as Elciego and Cuzcurrita del Río Tirón).

Delve into its medieval layouts, with long and narrow streets, squares and alleys that invite you to get lost, and let yourself be carried away by its lively and welcoming atmosphere. Explore its rich heritage, from medieval buildings, such as castles, towers or walls, to palaces, churches, and even archaeological remains such as dolmens or cave wine presses. Enjoy gastronomic and handicraft products in its local stores and mingle with the locals: **Rioja is known for the hospitality of its people**.

To immerse yourself in the Rioja lifestyle, **do not hesitate to get lost and let yourself be carried away by its streets, tasting Rioja wines in its bars and restaurants**. Accompany them with pinchos or typical products of each area and toast with your family and friends in a unique atmosphere. Some of wineproducing villages rank among the Most Beautiful Villages of Spain

3. Vineyard experiences

The cultural landscape of wine is the perfect setting for enjoying Rioja wine. An outdoor space, with a beauty nowhere else to be found the world, which offers **a wide range** of leisure possibilities for all tastes throughout the year.

In Rioja, you can live exciting and authentic experiences among vineyards, such as workshops, treasure hunts, horseback riding, cycling or flying over them in a balloon, where you will get to observe the vineyard from another point of view and collect unforgettable postcards in your memory. Another great experience you simply cannot miss out on if you visit Rioja is to have **a meal or lunch among the vineyards, near the "guardaviñas"** (stone-walled vineyard huts), with typical products of the region paired with the best typical Rioja wines.

In addition, if you visit Rioja during harvest time, you will get to live the unique experience of participating in the the harvest chores, another great must-have activity.



4. Logroño and its culture

Logroño, capital of La Rioja, hides many charming corners and holds more history than it counts.

At the same time dynamic and calm, the capital has been welcoming visitors and pilgrims since its origins. Its old

town, with a historical and architectural heritage that is worth uncovering, is reflected in the waters of the Ebro River, which bathes the city, making an impressive postcard. Logroño, or "cruce de caminos (crossroads), as a popular song says, stands out for its wine culture, which has its greatest exponent in the old wine cellars and in the surroundings of Calle Laurel and Calle San Juan, internationally known wine and tapas area of the city. The capital surroundings also hosts 8 wineries open to the public, with recreational and cultural activities offered throughout the year.

5. Haro and the Train Station Neighborhood

Haro is a wine-producing city known worldwide for its wine and its famous Barrio de la Estación, **the largest concentration of century-old wineries in the world**. A unique space that perfectly represents the essence of this region, without which existence the history of Rioja that began to take shape in the second half of the 19th century, cannot be understood, with the old Haro railroad station standing as its central axis. A visit to the Barrio de la Estación offers an authentic walk through the origins of Rioja.

Moreover, Haro is much more than wine: culture, landscape, gastronomy... For this reason, it is worth touring its old town, declared an Asset of Cultural Interest, contemplate its many churches and palaces, and, of course, enjoy the best of its gastronomy in the Herradura area.

The "Barrio de la Estación" brings together the largest concentration of centuryold wineries in the world



6. Wine Trails and Wine Routes

The Wine Trails and Wine Routes are paths where you can immerse yourself in the heart of Rioja. These trails delve into the spectacular landscape of Rioja vineyards, allowing you to explore and enjoy it in an authentic, healthy, and sustainable way.

These trails run through the surroundings of numerous wine-producing villages in Rioja and their layout allows visitors to enjoy valuable resources. Natural in character, since in addition to vineyards, many of them run through pine forests, riverbanks, or unique corners where nature shines in all its splendor. It is also worth mentioning its cultural and historical character, finding trails that

7. Gastronomic streets

Tapas and pinchos are a gastronomic and social tradition rooted deeply into Riojan culture. These present an ideal way to taste a wide variety of flavors of a cuisine that crosses borders, in a casual and relaxed atmosphere. Undoubtedly, the best settings to enjoy the unique atmosphere of tapas in the company of a glass of Rioja are the gastronomic streets of Rioja municipalities.

To speak of Logroño is to speak inevitably of Calle Laurel and Calle San Juan, which are quintessential pinchos areas. This

emblematic zone in the Rioja capital is renowned worldwide for its excellent food and wine. You will find hundreds of bars with "miniature" gastronomic specialties that will make you live a unique experience in the best of environments.

Also worthy of special mention are the Herradura area in Haro as well as the historic center of Laguardia. Both gastronomic areas will offer you countless options to taste Rioja in every bite and sip.

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
8. Wine Museums

Located in Briones, the Vivanco Museum of Wine Culture is a unique place in the world that allows visitors to delve into the culture of Rioja in a fun and entertaining way for all audiences.

Learn while having fun in over 4,000 m² divided into different spaces: its permanent exhibition, where you can discover the history and future of wine, from vessels or presses with centuries of history to great works of art (by artists such as Picasso, Sorolla, Juan Gris, Chillida, Barceló, Miró, Chagall, Warhol, etc.), audiovisuals, temporary exhibitions, or the spectacular Bacchus Garden, a whole ampelographic space in homage to the vineyard with more than 220 varieties of grapes from across the world.

Another great option to learn about the world of wine is the **Villa Lucia Wine Center in Laguardia**, an innovative space with a dynamic tour focused on the history and rituals of wine fusing craftsmanship with state-of-the-art technologies. Its strength is a 4D sensory experience dedicated to the heritage, tradition, and culture of Rioja Alavesa.

In Vivanco and Villa Lucía you can get to know the wine culture through numerous activities




9. Historic winery districts

Faithful witnesses of our history, centuries ago, wineries were built in Rioja, dug into the rock, like caves, for the production and storage of wine, the fruit of our land. Over the years, the establishment of cooperatives in the villages gave rise to a different way of making and storing wine, and over the years, this type of winery gradually lost its former importance.

In many villages in Rioja you can take a journey into the past through the "Historic Winery Districts"

However, some groups of buildings have survived to the present day, giving rise to what we know today as "Historic Winery Districts". These wine tourism resources are unique in the world, offering visitors to take a journey into the past and learn about the history of Rioja in its earlier times.

Some of the best options for getting to know a historic Rioja winery district are the winery districts of Quel, Cenicero, Rodezno, Cuzcurrita, Labastida, and Laguardia.



10. The exquisite Rioja gastronomy

Rioja is a paradise to enjoy wine and gastronomy. A gastronomy with its own personality, based on the highest-quality local products. Traditional but constantly evolving, it invites you to savor the culture, history, and landscape of this unique region.

From "patatas a la riojana" (potatoes with chorizo) or chuletillas al sarmiento (grilled

lamb chops) to the miniature gastronomy of the pinchos, going through original avant-garde creations using the state-ofthe-art cooking techniques.

The gastronomy of Rioja is varied and can be enjoyed in many different ways: in traditional restaurants, in Michelin-starred restaurants, in wineries, in our legendary tapas bars, or in the renowned tapas streets of our villages.



11. Parties and events

Throughout the year, you will find festivals or events dedicated to wine in every corner of Rioja. Taking part in one of them is a unique and authentic experience that will allow you to connect with the essence of our region and its people.

Some of the major wine festivals are the **Haro Wine** Battle, held in June, or the festivals held during the grape harvest (at the end of September), true spectacles of exaltation of the product that bestows its identity upon Rioja. The Rioja Alavesa Grape Harvest Festival and the Logroño Wine Festival, coinciding with the San Mateo Festival, stand out in this respect.

Throughout the year, there are also other more recent events such as "La Cata del Barrio de

la Estación" (The Train Station District Tasting), "En-torno a la mesa" (Around the Table), or the "Otoño de Sabores" (Autumn of Flavors). In these, we commonly find our famous wines, markets of artisan products, pinchos contests, as well as many other attractions that, together with wine and gastronomy as big-show highlights, bring the Rioja food and wine culture to perfection.





12. Historical wine heritage

Rioja is full of traces of history, chronicles of a region that has lived by and for wine for thousands of years, and today proudly reflects its heritage, which speaks of viticulture and winemaking in the past.

In this line, places and monuments such as the **Cueva de los Cien Pilares, in Arnedo**, stand out for their uniqueness. It is a complex and spectacular network of caves, standing as a perfect example of cave architecture. It was excavated under the Cerro de San Miguel in the Middle Ages as a refuge and hiding place. However, the caves have had numerous and varied uses as dwellings, stables, cellars, and even religious sites.

It is also worth mentioning the different types of winemaking resources dotting the unique landscape of Rioja vineyards and surprising those who walk through it and offering postcards full of charm and history. This is the case of the **cave wine presses**, yielding an idea of how wine was made in the Middle Ages, **the huts, or the vineyard guards**.

13. Nature in its purest form

In its area, Rioja hides landscapes and corners that could well be found in an entire continent. The influences of the Mediterranean and Atlantic climates that converge in the region offer a great variety and contrasts between **unique landscapes to enjoy throughout the year**.

The seas of vineyards, the hallmark of Rioja, and the birthplace of the wines

that have consolidated the region as one of the most renowned wine regions in the world, are surrounded by a natural environment one will enjoy getting lost in.

Mountain ranges where rocks and valleys meet, giving rise to ideal scenery for nature tourism lovers and acting as the best backdrop for Rioja landscapes, such as the Sierra de Toloño, the Obarenes Mountains, the Sierra de Moncalvillo, or the Sierra de la Hez.

There are also numerous rivers in Rioja that irrigate the region and act as another authentic destination, with banks featuring characteristic flora grows and which offer especially attractive paths spearheaded by water routes.



14. Rioja, cradle of the Spanish language

To speak of wine culture in Rioja is to speak of the many monasteries that were built in the Middle Ages in the region valleys, today converted into true jewels of our heritage, buildings that treasure history, culture, legends, religion, as well as wine within their walls. Centuries ago, a deep relationship between wine and language was forged in these monasteries.

Specifically, the Monasteries of Yuso and Suso, in San Millán de la Cogolla (La Rioja) are home to the first wri-

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tten vestiges of Spanish, dating back to the 11th century, in which wine is already mentioned. It is in the Monastery of Yuso where Gonzalo de Berceo, the first medieval poet, lived as a monk and contributed to the development of the language that is spoken today by nearly 600 million people across the world.


A traditional meal to savor Rioja

Following a morning of learning in our wineries, feel free to recharge your batteries with an authentic Riojan menu in a traditional restaurant.

Delight yourself with dishes such as Rioja-style potatoes, vegetable stew, vine shoot chops, or Rioja-style cod. To enhance your gastronomic experience even more, don't forget to pair them with an exquisite Rioja.

Laguardia, one of the most beautiful villages in Spain

In the afternoon, you are encouraged to head towards Rioja Alavesa and **immerse yourself in one of the region's charming towns**, such as Laguardia, recognized as one of the Most Beautiful Villages in Spain. Its narrow and elongated streets, squares and alleys surrounded by an imposing medieval wall of the XII-XIII century, have preserved its historical atmosphere intact. Take advantage of the day to explore the surrounding area, where fields of vineyards are interspersed with archaeological remains such as the Hoya site and numerous dolmens, which bear witness to its rich history

Finally, you are invited to **explore the charming old town of Laguardia by night,** where medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, and neoclassical buildings are illuminated, all creating a magical atmosphere. 
Haro train station district, the golden mile of Rioja

ral style, while others have opted for avant-garde trends. You can visit some of them or simply go to their wine bars to enjoy a wine tasting in these, internationally recognized for the quality of their wines.



Haro, much more than just wine

It is worth touring its old town, declared of Cultural Interest, contemplate its many churches and palaces, discover its historic urban cellar, from the early nineteenth century, and, of course, **enjoy the best of its gastronomy** in the area of La Herradura: the vegetable stew, potatoes with chorizo, stuffed peppers, "embuchados" (lamb trip meatballs) or "chuletillas al sarmiento" (grilled lamb chops) are some of the dishes you can not miss out on during your visit to the city

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On your last morning in the region, be sure to discover **Logroño, the capital of La Rioja.** Bathed by the Ebro River, Logroño stands out for its wine cellars, the wine culture that permeates its streets and gastronomy, as well as for its old town, or the Camino de Santiago.

Logroño offers a diversity of experiences as you walk through its streets and explore its heritage. If you have time left, you can visit one of the wineries near the city center.

Tapas in Laurel street and San Juan street



Numerous bars offer the most varied and succulent pinchos, made with the best products in the area. Accompany them with your favorite Rioja and enjoy them in the company of your loved ones.



Fun in the vineyards

To bid farewell to your Rioja getaway, be sure to live **a wine tourism experience among vineyards** in Rioja Oriental.

Discover the landscape with a ride through the vineyards on horseback, by bike or in a hot air balloon. Learn all the mysteries of the vineyard from real experts in viticulture and complete your experience enjoying a **meal in this enviable natural environment**: a "guardaviñas" (stone-walled vineyard hut), in the vineyard itself, on a terrace or porch... A **picnic or lunch with local products** (sausages and cheeses, vegetables, homemade bread...) paired with the best Rioja wines is the ideal option to complete a rounded experience in the Rioja vineyards.

> You are invited to discover Laguardia, one of the Most Beautiful Villages in Spain

DAY 1

Laguardia, history, and wine

Your adventure begins in **Rioja Alavesa**. The wealth of this wine region deserves at least a couple of days to visit it. We recommend staying in Laguardia, Elciego, or Labastida, which offer a variety of accommodations, including hotels in wineries and rural options among vineyards to ensure an authentic wine tourism experience.

On the first day, you are invited to discover **Laguardia**, one of the Most Beautiful Villages in Spain, with its undisturbed medieval atmosphere, cobblestone streets, and a 12th-13th-century wall.

Explore the surrounding countryside with vineyards dotted with archaeological remains and enjoy hiking trails with scenic and historical appeal. Discover the historic center with buildings of different architectural styles and taste the **Basque-Riojan gastronomy** in local establishments. Be sure not to miss out on the **Villa Lucía Wine Theme Center**, where you will live a 4D wine tourism experience and learn about the history and rituals of wine in Rioja Alavesa in a fun and educational way through the innovative Wine Museum.

Avant-garde architecture and tradition

On the second day in Rioja Alavesa, you will visit **Elciego, one of the Magical Villages of Spain**. We recommend taking a pleasant stroll through its charming old town, where you can discover different stately homes, palaces, and its Plaza Mayor, before reaching an essential stop: the **Wine City of Marqués de Riscal**.

The iconic avant-garde building designed by Frank O. Gehry is one of the main attractions of the Marqués de Riscal Wine City in Rioja. Explore its surroundings, visit the winery, and enjoy some wine tasting. In addition, during your stay in the City of Wine, you can enjoy a **wide range of gastronomic offerings** that combine the traditional cuisine of the region with avant-garde proposals, advised by the Riojan chef Francis Paniego.

In the afternoon, feel free to explore the emblematic village of Labastida in Rioja Alavesa, known for its nature, history, gastronomy, and wine culture. Visit the subway cellars, stroll through its **medieval old town**, and admire the stately homes, palaces, churches, and hermitages. Discover the murals that adorn the buildings, combining the modern with the traditional and highlighting the wine culture. Don't miss on the **"lagar rupestre" (ancient wine cave and press)** from the Middle Ages, which reveals part of the history of Rioja wine. Finally, be sure to enjoy the lively nightlife in the bars, delighting yourself with the delicious local gastronomy accompanied by a glass of Rioja.



Haro and its Train Station District

Starting from your third day in Rioja, you will delve into **Rioja Alta**. To explore the heart of La Rioja, we recommend staying in the Haro or Logroño area.

You can start by discovering Haro, one of the most outstanding wine-producing towns in the DOCa Rioja.

During the morning, you are invited to visit the **Barrio de la Estación in Haro**, the

golden mile of Rioja. This will be a journey through the history of Rioja full of combinations of avant-garde architecture with traditional styles. Stopping at the centenary wineries and enjoying the wine bars is a must. In addition, dining there offers a high-quality enogastronomic experience with local products and the best wines from their collections.

To complete your stay in Haro, be sure to

visit the old town, declared a Historic-Monumental Site, and discover its rich cultural, historical, scenic, and gastronomic offerings. In addition to its churches and palaces, you can visit its historic urban winery and enjoy the **delicious gastronomy of the Herradura area**. Do not miss on dishes such as vegetable stew, potatoes with chorizo, stuffed peppers, "embuchadosos" (pork tripe meatballs) or "chuletillas al sarmiento" (grilled lamb chops).



DAY 4

Logroño, capital of La Rioja

During this day we propose you to discover **Logroño, the capital of La Rioja**. Bathed by the Ebro River, this city stands out for its wine cellars, the wine culture that permeates its streets and gastronomy, but also for its old town or the Camino de Santiago.

In the morning, feel free to stroll through the **old town** and marvel at its heritage, such as the Co-cathedral of Santa María La Redonda, the Church of San Bartolomé, and the Iron Bridge. Spend your afternoon visiting **one of the wineries near the city center**. These offer a host of wine tourism experiences, from guided tours with tastings and local appetizers to paired menus of haute cuisine. On special dates, you can enjoy cultural activities such as Suena Verano, summer cinemas, and MUWI La Rioja Music Fest, spearheaded by wine and gastronomy.

For lunch or dinner, you can **enjoy the gastronomic essence** of the city in its tapas areas: Calle Laurel and Calle San Juan. In its numerous bars, you will find varied and succulent pinchos, made with the best local products. We recommend accompanying them with your favorite Rioja wine.

Another option is to indulge in dining in one of the 3 **Michelin-Star restaurants** in town offering extraordinary dishes that reinvent Riojan cuisine with avant-garde techniques.



DAY 5

Learning and history in the heart of Rioja Alta

Spend part of the day in Rioja Alta enjoying a fun and interactive learning experience at the **Vivanco Museum of Wine Culture** in Briones.

This unique space in the world has a permanent exhibition where you can discover the history and future of wine, as well as enjoy audiovisuals, temporary exhibitions, and the spectacular Bacchus Garden, an ampelographic space that pays tribute to the vineyard featuring over 220 grape varieties all across the world.

After this experience, it is time to discover **Briones**, the municipality where this

unique museum is located. This town, forming part of the Most Beautiful Villages of Spain and has been declared a Historic-Artistic Site, features a charming medieval urban fabric and numerous buildings of interest, such as the Ermita del Cristo, palaces, towers, and ancestral homes. In its historic center, you can enjoy the **traditional cuisine of the area**, such as "patatas a la riojana" (patatos with chorizo) or "chuletillas al sarmiento" (grilled lamb chops).

If you still have time, we encourage you to travel to **Sajazarra**, which is only 20 kilometers away. This picturesque fortified village, recognized as one of the Most Beautiful Villages in Spain, has a 15th-century castle that is a must-see tourist destination. Strolling among its narrow medieval streets, you can discover the works of contemporary art that are part of its museum and are scattered throughout the village.

To end your day, whether in Briones or Sajazarra, we suggest you immerse yourself in the **atmosphere of tapas in its historic centers** and have a glass of Rioja with the locals.

DAY 6

Eastern Rioja, orchards, and vineyards

On your next morning in Rioja, you are invited discover the third and last wine region of the DOCa: **Rioja Oriental**. Calahorra, Alfaro, and Arnedo offer a wide selection of accommodations for lodging.

During your first morning in Rioja Oriental, you will get to know one of the most outstanding gastronomic destinations in the region: **Calahorra**. This city is famous for the high quality of its vegetables, the bigshow highlights of Riojan gastronomy. The city hosts events, markets, and even **hiking trails** called "Senderos de la Verdura" (Vegetable Trails). Trip to Rioja's past in Arnedo and Quel

On your first stop in Arnedo, you can visit its 9th-century castle, the Church of Santo Tomás, the Church of Santa Eulalia, and baroque palace houses, all forming part of its rich **historical and patrimonial heritage**. After that, be sure to enjoy a unique experience in the "Cueva de los Cien Pilares" (Cave of the Hundred Pillars), an impressive complex of caves excavated in the Middle Ages. After that, you can enjoy a gastronomic variety in calle Libertad, where you will find delicious "pinchos" (tapas) and "banderillas" (skewers) made with seasonal vegetables and the best oil in the area, all accompanied by Rioja wine. We suggest you conclude your trip in the **Historic Quarter of Bodegas de Quel**, the finishing touch to get to know our wine culture. This district is home to more than two hundred galleries carved into the rock, forming a complex network of galleries at different levels, which were used for wine production and storage.






Rioja offers an **excellent reception infrastructure**. International **air communications** can be made mainly through Bilbao airport. A one-hour transfer will take us to Rioja Alavesa or Haro, in Rioja Alta. Logroño is an hour and a half's drive from Bilbao airport.

Access via the AVE high-speed train from Zaragoza Delicias will take us to the

wineries of Rioja Oriental in just over an hour. Madrid offers direct connections to Logroño Agoncillo airport. From Madrid, Barcelona or Bilbao, road connections can be made mainly by highway.

A differential lodging infrastructure

These include Marqués de Riscal, Ysios, Beronia, Baigorri, Viña Real, Campo Viejo, Ramon Bilbao, Margues de Teran, Roda or Lanzaga.
- **..** Wineries surrounded by vineyards: wineries surrounded by vineyards in the heart of the Rioja wine region. Focused on the château philosophy, where tradition and nature merge to offer you unique experiences in the exciting vineyard landscape of Rioja. Marqués de Murrieta, Contino, Finca La Emperatriz, Finca Valpiedra, Campillo, El Ternero, David Moreno, Pujanza, Viñedos de Paganos, are just some of the examples that can be found in the DOCa.

- Ancient wineries: with a long tradition and prestige, they were designed and conceived solely and exclusively to produce the finest wines. The recent commitment to wine tourism has made its values and history known, which exceeds 100 years, constituting some of the major Rioja wine brands, such as La Rioja Alta, CVNE, Bodegas Bilbaínas, Muga, Gomez Cruzado, Lopez de Heredia, Bodegas Riojanas, Bodegas Franco Españolas, Montecillo, Bodegas de la Marguesa, and many many others.
- . Family-owned wineries: these family-owned wineries embody an unwavering passion for wine culture and wine tourism. These offer a variety of services including guided tours and tastings, with the special feature of being accompanied by direct family members. This experience adds exceptional value for visitors, as they can enjoy close contact with those who know every detail of the winery and its legacy to perfection. Winter: dormant life

With a new year coming in, the vineyards in Rioja are preparing for a new cycle. The vine has lost its leaves, it sleeps, and a moment of vital importance arrives: **pruning**.

At this time of year, it is not uncommon to find a white blanket covering the vineyards in some areas of Rioja, making **beautiful winter picture**s, difficult to find in other parts of the country.

The Riojan sky grants its visitors days of sunshine and light, even in winter. Visiting some wineries in Rioja (family-owned, centenary, avant-garde, etc.) and taking advantage of their hospitality, enjoying their wine tourism experiences offers a great way to escape from the cold.

If you want to warm up, you shouldn't miss out on a **succulent Riojan me**nu, with which you can taste the most traditional dishes of the region, such as "patatas a la riojana" (potatoes with chorizo), "chuletillas al sarmiento" (grilled lamb chops), or "caparrones" (red kidney beans), all washed down with an excellent wine from the region. Slightly better sheltered, a walk through one of the 144 municipalities that make up the region can complete the plan; its photogenic corners, small hidden museums, and a cozy smell of firewood will bring you back to happy past times.

Long weekends in the last months of the year, and even the Christmas holidays offer a great opportunity to enjoy the exceptional atmosphere in the region and to toast with Rioja wine on these special dates.

Spring: life breaks through



The flowering of the vineyard begins. From the cuts made during pruning, a tearing called "weeping" begins to appear. The first green shoots also begin to appear, which will grow into clusters well into spring, changing the vineyard colors.

Spring in Rioja offers **sunny days** with **very pleasant temperatures** to enjoy wine and its culture, both indoors and outdoors. Right in the spring, the senses of smell and taste intensify. The higher the humidity, the greater the odor permeation, so this is the **ideal time of the year for wine tasting and to perceive all its nuances**, and to complete it with vineyard experiences. Enjoying the pleasant sensation of spring sunshine and toasting with a glass of Rioja while you prepare your next adventure here, such as guided tours of the region's towns, places, museums, as well as activities in the middle of nature are just some of the plans to enjoy in this season as the daylight hours become longer.

Summer: time of magical changes

Summer is the time when **most significant changes in the vineyard take place**. At the beginning of the summer season, the bunches are at their most magical moment and veraison begins, a process in which the grapes, which until then have been small acid green berries, begin to grow and change to their final color. The **veraison** will determine the quality of the wine since it is here that color, aroma, and flavor are defined.

A summer getaway to Rioja is sure to convince you that summer is not all "sun and sand". Hiking and/or cycling wine routes, which go deep into the vineyard landscape so typical and unique to the region, is one of the best options to enjoy your vacation, breathe fresh air, and get in touch with nature.

We also recommend visiting one of the **viewpoints** in the region to contemplate the spectacular views that Rioja offers at sunset over the immense landscape of vineyards.

In addition, summer is a time for celebration in Rioja. During the summer months, a great variety of **festivals, concerts, and events** take place, where wine and gastronomy are the big-show highlights: summer cinemas, festivals such as MUWI, Suena Verano con Diamante, Entorno a la Mesa, and much much more. At the end of June, one of the most popular wine festivals, the **Batalla del Vino** (Wine Battle), takes place in Haro.



A RIOJA FOR EVERY SEASON

Autumn: the grape harvest, the great Rioja wine festival

With the onset of autumn, temperatures fall. Thanks to the warmth of the day and the cool of the night, the sugars in the grapes begin to react and the final color change takes place, with the white varieties turning a full range of yellows and the reds turning various shades of red. The most important moment of the year - the grape harvest - arrives, , which reflects the work and effort carried out through the whole cycle. During the early autumn months, the teams work at full capacity in the fields to harvest the grapes that would later be treated with great care and affection in the wineries to make Rioja wines, the symbol and pride of our region.

If the polychrome of coppers, reds, purples, and yellows that stain the vineyards at this time or the approach to a process as historical and cultural as the grape harvest did not make for enough reason to visit the region during the autumn, the festive and celebratory atmosphere that pervades Rioja during the grape harvest ends up convincing thousands and thousands of tourists who visit us at this time of the year.

One of the great stagings of the grape harvest takes place at the end of September **in Logroño, with the Fiestas de San Mateo**. Days of joy and celebration in which grapes and wine take center stage, accompanied by gastronomy, music, sports, parades and, above all, loads of fun. The grape harvest festival is celebrated in many other municipalities of Rioja with festivals in which visitors are welcomed with open arms. Participating in these celebrations and traditions by toasting the year's harvest with a glass of Rioja offers an authentic and unique wine tourism experience.

And it's not all about celebrating: you can also **take a direct part in the grape harvest.** More and more wineries in Rioja offer visitors the opportunity to get their hands (and feet) dirty and help in the harvesting or treading of the grapes, an experience well fitted for the youngest members of the family as well.

After the grapes are harvested, the vineyard takes a break, forming a true puzzle of colors that is worth visiting, until it loses its leaves and the cyclical process of the vine begins again.

Rioja never rests. At any time of the year, diversity - be it landscapes, experiences, plans, or wines - is offered.

HOW TO GET TO RIOJA

Thanks to its privileged location, Rioja is a fully accessible territory, with excellent communications both by land and by air. Its extensive road network, as well as its railroad service and several nearby airports with national and international connections, we provide easy access to the destination whatever your means of transport and invite you to travel from end to end, discovering our villages, wineries, heritage, gastronomy, landscapes, etc. Below, we present the different alternatives to reach our region and enjoy the authentic Rioja wine tourism experience.

BY PLANE

Bilbao Loiu Airport, one hour from Haro and one hour and a half from Logroño. It offers direct connections to Europe, with direct flights from Amsterdam, Berlin, Brussels, Stockholm or London, among over 50 destinations available.

Vitoria Foronda Airport is half an hour from Haro and one hour from Logroño. It offers passenger transportation services with Ryanair, which has 7 destinations, 4 domestic and 3 international (Cologne-Bonn, Milan-Bergamo and Brussels-Charleroi).

Zaragoza Airport is one hour from Alfaro and one hour and a half from Logroño. Apart from services to the Canary and Balearic Islands, it also offers international services to 9 destinations including Brussels, London, Milan, Paris and Treviso.

Logroño Agoncillo Airport offers direct flights to Madrid.

BY ROAD



From Madrid, Logroño can be reached in less than 4 hours by traveling on the AP-2 and N-111 freeways and Rioja Alavesa via the AP-1.

The route from Barcelona to Logroño takes less than 5 hours via the AP-2, and AP-68 to Rioja Alavesa.



The **Renfe** network provides connections from large capitals to municipalities such as Haro, Logroño, and some towns in the Eastern Rioja through ALVIA trains.

Another option to arrive from Madrid or Barcelona is to use the High Speed trains to Zaragoza-Delicias station. From there, in just over an hour, you can get to enjoy Rioja.



Travelers from the British Isles can travel by ferry from Portsmouth (England) or Rosslare (Ireland) with their car to Bilbao. From there, you will get to Rioja in just over an hour.
